THESE BIRDS WERE ONCE NUMEROUS IN THE NORFOLK AND SUFFOLK
BRECKS BUT BECAME EXTINCT AS A BRITISH BREEDING SPECIES
IN 1832. UNSUCCESSFUL ATTEMPTS AT REINTRODUCTION HAVE
BEEN MADE, AND THE SPECIES TODAY IS A VERY RARE VAGRANT






A simple linear keyframe composition from my research into flight **AR:** the linear keyframe animation in motion
